### Future branch events

Tuesday, 12 September
Artillery Conquers: Infantry Occupies
Lieutenant Colonel Simon Shepherd
The Ed Shed at 7.30pm

Simon seeks to assess the performance of the BEF's artillery during the preparation for, and conduct of, the Third Battle of Ypres in 1917. To carry out this assessment, it uses a set of Principles of War published in the February 1916 edition of the RUSI Journal. These are often referenced as the start point for the way the British Army has subsequently developed its use of the Principles of War. The lecture will focus on the conduct of the artillery battles at Army, Corps and Divisional level for: Pilkem Ridge, 31 July - British Fifth Army; Menin Road Ridge, 20 September - British Second Army; Second Passchendaele, 26 October to 10 November - Canadian Corps.

Birdie – more than 'Soul of Anzac'

Field Marshal Lord Birdwood of Anzac and Totnes was given the accolade 'Soul of Anzac' in General Hamilton's second despatches from Gallipoli. Birdwood was one of a very few who left those shores with his reputation intact, perhaps



even enhanced. He took his beloved Anzacs to the Western Front where he became the ninth longest serving Corps Commander before finishing the war as one of Haig's five army commanders. This talk looks at Birdwood's distinguished life of service – personal, military and political.

## Corporal Albert George Bridges (2301) 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Gloucestershire Regiment

Albert George Bridges was born on 19 January 1896 at Ascott-under-Wychwood, Oxfordshire. He was the eldest of four children born to Edward William Bridges and his wife Elizabeth.

By the time of the 1911 Census the family had moved to Station Cottage at Gotherington and George (he appears to have been known by his second name) was employed as a mason in the building trade.

According to a report in the *Gloucestershire Echo* he enlisted in the Army from Cavendish House, Cheltenham at the start of the war. It is not clear if he was an employee of that well-known retail store. He was posted to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment. His Medal Roll Index Card states his rank as Lance Corporal, rising to Corporal, so he may have had some form of military experience prior to the war but in the absence of a service record this cannot be ascertained.

He was sent to France on 12 March 1915, as part of a draft of 113 men, who joined up with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Glosters at Dickebusch a few days later. It was reported that he received a slight wound during the Battle of Second Ypres the following month.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Glosters arrived in Salonika on 12 December 1915. As part of 81 Brigade, 27 Division, they joined an Anglo-French force resisting the Bulgarian advance in Northern Greece.

Little action was seen by the battalion until the end of September 1916. On 30 September it was

deployed to the north east of Salonika, along the left bank of the River Struma facing

Bulgarian positions in the

villages of Karajakoi Bala and Karajakoi Zir. An operation was mounted to clear these villages and the Glosters. along with t h e 2<sup>nd</sup> Cameron Highlanders, was assigned to the capture of the former. The attack went in at 5.30am and by 9am the objective had been taken and consolidation was undertaken. During the night of 30 September/1 October the Bulgarians mounted counterattacks using artillery and heavy rifle fire but were repulsed. The

operation had cost the  $2^{nd}$  Glosters fifty five casualties amongst other ranks.

George Bridges was one of these. Reports vary as to whether he was killed in action or died of wounds but it would appear likely that it was the latter, as his date of death is recorded as 1 October 1916 and he came to be buried in Lahana Military Cemetery, which served burials from the Struma sector and in particular No 27 Casualty Clearing Station. His headstone has an unusual inscription *Mizpah Gen. 31.49*: 'mizpah' is Hebrew for 'watchtower' and (part of) the reference to a passage from the Book of Genesis reads 'May the Lord keep watch between you and me when we are away from each other'. He is commemorated on the Gotherington War Memorial.
