On August 4th 1914, with the declaration of war between Britain and Germany, reservist Tommy Atkins is immediately called up to serve his country. Within weeks he sees his first action in the fields of France and subsequently experiences the full scale of life in the Western Front trenches of the First World War - the horror, the pain, the misery, the boredom and even the moments of joy.

This play, written and performed by Peter, details through the eyes of a simple 'Tommy' the reality of war. From the beginning of the war to the end, Private Tommy Atkins was there. This is his story.

Field Marshal Lord Byng of Vimy is a largely forgotten figure of the First World War. The talk will examine Byng's major involvement in the battles of Vimy Ridge and Cambrai in 1917 and his response to the Ludendorff Offensive, and 100 Days campaign in 1918. Also his background and early life will be looked at.

22053 Private Lionel Victor Gray 10th Battalion, Canadian Infantry

Lionel Victor (Vic) Gray was born in 1894, the son of Mrs Alexandra Gray of 29 Lansdown, Stroud. He emigrated to Canada in 1912 and when the war was declared volunteered at once, arriving in England with the first contingent of Canadian troops. After training he and his unit went to France on 1 April 1915 and he was soon wounded in action, although not seriously.

At Christmas 1915, following a period of leave, he went back to join his unit and took part in the Battle of Mount Sorrel, near Ypres, between 2 - 13 June 1916.

At seven minutes past 1pm on 2 June, after a vicious artillery bombardment which lasted two hours, German assault troops, who had been secreted in underground bunkers opposite the Canadian Corps left their trenches and overwhelmed the defenders before they had



chance to organise themselves. There had been no prior indication of the German intentions. Despite their initial victory, the lost trenches were re-taken from the Germans by the Canadians ten days later. Both sides lost over 5,000 killed, missing or wounded in this action.

Private Gray was killed on the second day of this engagement and, having no known grave, is commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial. He is also commemorated on the St Paul's Church Memorial (as V Gray) but his connection with Cheltenham is unknown.

His brothers Alec, who served with the Gloucesters and the RAMC, and Douglas, 1st Battalion, Welsh Guards, were both wounded during the war.

Faces of the Battle of Arras - a town trail showing a photographic exhibition featuring portraits of soldiers serving during the battle.

18 March to 11 June

Witnesses at the Museum of Fine Arts.

An exhibition on loan from the Canadian War Museum showing works by soldiers serving in Artois in 1917.

(Re)Trenches at the Museum of Fine Arts.

A trench reconstruction in the main courtyard.

1917: Saint-Vaast Abbey

An exhibition at the Abbey of photographs and eye-witness accounts to discover and remember the story of the Abbey during the Great War.

2 to 12 April

Poppy of peace - Victory Medal at the Place des Heros.

A participative work which honours the New Zealand soldiers who fought in the Great War.

8 April

Inter-religious Ceremony at Saint-Vaast Cathedral commemorating the men of all faiths who fell during the Great War.

Flowers in the gun barrel at Casino.

A theatre work based on authentic accounts and chronicles from the front.

9 April at 6.30am

Dawn ceremony at the Wellington Tunnels, Memorial to the Battle of Arras.

A memorial ceremony paying tribute to the British and Commonwealth soldiers who fought in the battle.
